

Junior Activities Patch Program

GOLD LEVEL 2: 4th - 8th

American Legion Auxiliary Junior members and Sons of The American Legion youth members can be active participants of the organization with the Patch Program. Regardless of where one lives, and whether she/he belongs to an active Junior group or squadron, Junior Auxiliary members and SAL youth members can serve their communities and veterans, and learn about patriotism, health, fitness, and leadership through this program.

Each sheet explains the criteria and what must be accomplished to earn a specific patch. When the activities are completed, an adult or Senior member must sign the form to verify that the Junior or SAL youth has met the patch criteria.

There are three levels of patch criteria:

- Red—Level 1: Kindergarten through 3rd grade
- Gold—Level 2: 4th grade through 8th grade
- Blue—Level 3: 9th grade through 12th grade (or 18 years old)

CHILDREN OF WARRIORS NATIONAL PRESIDENTS' PATCH

The National Presidents' Scholarship provides scholarships to deserving children of our nation's veterans and servicemembers who have sacrificed greatly due to their parents' dedication to defending America and our values.

A special Junior patch has been created for our Junior members and SAL youth to be involved in raising money for the National Presidents' Scholarship Fund. Help get the word out to all our members! We hope every Junior and SAL youth will be involved in some activity to raise money for scholarships, which are funded by the Educating Children of Warriors Fund. Most Juniors and SAL youth will become eligible for this scholarship, so they may be personally impacted by their fundraising efforts.

Any Junior or SAL youth can earn this patch if they raise at least \$5 for each year old. For example, a 17-year-old would raise a minimum of $$85 (17 \times $5 = $85.)$

Donations can be raised a variety of ways. Juniors and SAL youth can solicit donations from family, friends, Legion Family members or contribute themselves. Fundraising activities can be coordinated, such as bake sales or other sales, etc. Funds can be raised individually or as a group, but each Junior or SAL youth receiving this patch needs to have raised the required minimum funds for their age. The goal is for the youth of our organization to be involved and aware of the scholarship project. Checks should be made out to *National Treasurer*, *American Legion Auxiliary* with *National Presidents' Scholarship* in the memo line.

9	With the help of an adult, make and send cards to our servicemembers stationed overseas (for example: Valentine's Day, Thanksgiving and Christmas).

*8	Read a minimum of ten books and write a book report on one of the books to share with an adult. Attach a written log of the books you have read to this form.		
9	Interview a teacher (past or present) and find out why s/he chose teaching as a career. Is this something you would like to do, and why or why not? Discuss the results of the interview and your answers to the questions with an adult.

*9	Learn about Endurance, Flexibility, Strength, and Balance exercises and complete one (1) of each every day for two weeks.

1	To better understand the sacrifices of our veterans, research how poppies are made and by whom.		
2	Tell the story of the poppy to your Junior unit, squadron, friends or family members.		
3	Find two ways to educate members about the Poppy program and inform them.		
*4	Read the Poppy Story and "In Flanders Fields" and write a short story about your feelings. Attach it to this form.		
5	With a family member or advisor, make poppy tray favors and distribute them to a VA Hospital, VA Home or nursing home.		
6	Create a poppy window display for your unit, squadron or Post.		
7	Wear a poppy for five (5) days during Poppy Week. When asked, tell the story of the poppy.		
*8	Learn five (5) facts about the poppy and share them with an adult.		
9	With a family member or Junior advisor, distribute poppies and explain what they symbolize.		
10	Mail or deliver a poppy to your elected city officials, along with a letter explaining its meaning. Ask them to wear it during Poppy Week to honor our veterans.

2	Obtain a copy of the US Constitution, either via internet or by mail, and distribute copies to your class, unit or squadron.			
3	Create Good Citizenship cards to hand out to friends who demonstrate patriotism and Americanism.			
4	Create a poster depicting the 5 Purposes found in the Preamble of the US Constitution.			
5*	Study the history of the US Constitution and answer the following questions: • When and where was the Constitution signed? • Who signed the constitution? • Why are the words "We the People" important and where will you find them? • How many amendments are there? • What is the Bill of Rights and how does it affect your life today?			
6	Give a presentation to your class, unit or squadron on what it means to be a citizen of the United States.			
7	Choose a section of the Declaration of Independence and rewrite it in language that kids today would understand. Share it with your class, unit or squadron.			
8	Run for a class/school election or for honorary Junior officer.

2	With an adult, visit a VA Hospital, VA home or nursing home. Ask the veterans to tell you about places they have traveled.			
3	Write a report on "What is a Veteran" and share it with your unit, school or church.			
*4	Send eight (8) greeting cards to hospitalized or ill veterans.			
5	Participate in National Salute to Hospitalized Veteran Patients (week of February 14) to help honor and thank veterans.			
6	Volunteer to help a veteran or their family with yard work or chores.			
*7	Research three (3) other organizations that help veterans.			
8	Write a letter to the ALA National President or the SAL National Commander and tell them why you appreciate our veterans.			
9	Participate in a stand down for homeless veterans in your community.			
10	Adopt a veteran or veterans' home in your community for a period of no less than three (3) months. Visit, send them cards, gifts, etc.			
11	Participate in a special holiday program for veterans through your school, unit or church.			
12	Participate in Make a Difference Day and plan your activity around veterans.			
13	With help from your family, unit, squadron, church or school, start a group to adopt deployed service members and send them letters and presents.
